

DAVID COUTTS CHAIRMAN





CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

DAVID COUTTS CHAIRMAN

It is my absolute pleasure to write my first Chairman's Report as Chairman of the Southern Football Netball League. It is indeed an honour and privilege and I thank you all for your support through the year.

I must start by congratulating Mark Seymour on his service to the Southern Football Netball League. On his watch, the League has gone from strength to strength and furthermore, ensured he left the League in a better position from when he commenced his term. He continues to be a terrific supporter of grassroots and community sport.

This year the League consolidated on the work of previous years, with a greater focus being placed upon club sustainability and their volunteers.

The League was able to partner up with the Bendigo Bank Dingley Village to provide the Division 3 clubs access to the Terry Dillon Solutions program. The clubs have recently completed the first four months of the program and we can already see improvement in key areas of clubs regarding financial stability, volunteers and sponsorship. It is an exciting program that has seen clubs really buy in and we are expecting bigger and better things moving forward.

Throughout the year Board members will attend numerous clubs, watch matches and catch up with club executive members in their environment. A common theme is that there are so many quality individuals in this competition, passionate not only about their clubs, but also about their League. Their passion is infectious and I would like to thank and congratulate you all for the hard work that you undertake.

Interleague was an important date in our calendar this year. After AFL Victoria's decision to rank the leagues in Victoria, we were ranked 25th overall. This meant that we got to host the Ellinbank & District Football League in football and netball at Lyndhurst. The day was a success both on and off the field, with our Under 19 netball team getting the day off to a great start and finishing with our Senior football side securing a well-deserved victory. Whilst we might not be satisfied with our current ranking, it gives us the opportunity to climb the ladder and know that we will have earnt our position. Well done to Lyndhurst for doing a superb job of hosting the day, all the selection and coaching panels, the players and also the supporters. We will await our opponent for next year, which is yet to be announced, but it is safe to say - Interleague is back.

Our netball competition continues to go from strength to strength. This year we saw the number of teams participating in our netball competition increase further to 74 teams. The most pleasing part is that we had 26 of our 34 Member Clubs enter netball teams. For the first time, we also had an Under 19 competition, and this competition will continue to grow as we expect more teams to participate next year. In addition, we also saw the live radio broadcast of Division 1 & 2 Grand Finals from the Rowan Road facility for the first time by Southern FM.

The tender of our netball apparel was recently finalised. As per our football apparel tender the prior year, we received a large number of tenders but after assessment by the administration team, the incumbent supplier in TWP was selected. Their commitment to the League and their sharing of our vision moving forward will make for an exciting journey.

With the appointment of Will Hunter as our Media Officer, the bar has been raised in relation to our social and digital media. One initiative was the Media Day for all of our Division 1 clubs. This has been a great success and we will see more clubs, players, umpires and volunteers involved next year. The Awkward Bounce video series, one of the outcomes of the Media Day, has proven to be the hit of the year.

Another initiative undertaken this year was the fan engagement survey, Voice of the South. It gave all of our stakeholders the opportunity to provide feedback about all aspects of the League. It will prove beneficial for the League, as we set about our strategic plan for the next three years. Furthermore, the results of the surveys have been shared with the greater community.

We continue to work closer with our community partner, beyondblue. This year we had a themed round and a lunch prior to a rematch of last year's Division 1 Grand Final. Ex-AFL player and beyondblue ambassador James Podsiadly was the guest speaker but I can safely say, former Dingo Dan Bolger was the star. His story was very confronting and articulated why we need to do more to help raise awareness of mental illness. Furthermore, many of our clubs participated in the beyondblue Bash to raise funds for beyondblue.

One of the key pillars of the League is inclusion. With this in mind, next year will see the commencement of a Women's Football competition. The League has been extremely proactive in relation to this, establishing a working party early on to implement a strategy for the ensuring the competition's success. At this stage, it will be a



development competition and feedback from clubs has been very positive.

In relation to the Moorabbin Reserve redevelopment, it has been steady as she goes. There has been much work going on in the background, with League Vice Chairman Garry Cranny continuing to be a driving force for community sport. We will continue to keep you

updated as to the progress of the development and key dates. I must thank the entire Board for their contributions for the 2016 year. There are some Board members that are not seeking re-election and I thank you for your tireless work above and beyond the call of duty.

I would like to conclude the report with news that the Board has recently signed a contract extension of two years with the League CEO, David Cannizzo. This was seen by the Board as one of our most important decisions for the year, as we look to continue the good work of his term.

I am already looking forward to season 2017.

CEO'S REPORT

DAVID CANNIZZO CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

It is my pleasure to present a 2016 report for the Southern Football Netball League (SFNL). This year our organisation again has so much to be proud of and will be remembered for many positive activities.

The SFNL Board was led this year by new Chairman David Coutts and well supported by Vice Chairman Garry Cranny. The Board and administration conducted an important strategic planning workshop mid-year with the sole purpose to refresh and refine the existing strategic plan that ran over four pages. The outcome was a one-page, clear and concise plan that articulated our vision for the next two to three years.

There is significant momentum already for all our strategic pillars with many highlights achieved during 2016.

Women's Football has been all the talk since the AFL announced there would be a AFL Women's competition from 2017. The SFNL's desire to embrace this new offering is not new, and we have patiently sat back and waited for AFL Victoria's blessing to launch our own development competition. Earlier this year we established a working party and commenced our journey with clubs to ensure we had our own women's competition in 2017. 10 of our clubs expressed interest in being a part of the SFNL development competition, while a further four to five clubs that have existing women's teams are keen to participate with the SFNL. Each of these clubs attended our education workshops throughout the year, which focussed on assisting and guiding them on how to create women's teams.

Club viability continues to be a major focus point and it will always be in senior community sport. Overall, club health is stronger than in previous years and this is mainly due to the hard work of club volunteers, embracing innovation through growth and development of their clubs. This year we fully funded, in conjunction with Bendigo Bank Dingley Village, a club development and sustainability program for all Division 3 clubs - Terry Dillon Solutions. The program has been well received by all our clubs and their health check results have been extremely informative, particularly for identifying how the SFNL can further assist our clubs. Club health extends to a positive club culture and environment and, with the support of the Australian Drug Foundation, we ran illegal drugs education workshops where clubs were guided on how to introduce an illegal drugs policy in their club.

For the second consecutive year, we facilitated an exciting season launch, which this year featured a marquee match between Dingley and St Pauls on a Sunday afternoon at Trevor Barker Oval, Sandringham. Supporting this match as a curtain raiser was an Under 19 game between these two clubs, while the SFNL hosted a cocktail function attended by many dignitaries. Also in its second year was the SFNL Hall of Fame, which was established to acknowledge and celebrate persons who have made significant contributions to the SFNL or its forerunners. This year over 120 guests attended the function held at the Woodlands Golf Club where six people were inducted, including David Luttrell, Garry Matlock, Ken Shaw, Kingsley Ellis, Mark Seymour and our first female inductee Margaret Torpy.

In other wonderful community initiatives, the SFNL supported an inaugural Pride Shield match between St Kilda City and St Pauls that celebrated diversity, equality and inclusion in our competition. The match was supported by a cocktail luncheon where special guest speakers included Victorian State Government Commissioner for Gender and Sexuality Rowena Allen, Minister for Equality Martin Foley and the first openly gay footballer Jason Ball. The SFNL also expanded its community partnership with beyondblue through a dedicated round with marquee football and netball matches. This was strongly supported by the majority of clubs through the purchasing of blue socks and their own fundraising activities, which resulted in more than \$5,000 being donated to beyondblue.

Without doubt one of the marketing highlights for the year was the introduction of a SFNL Media Day for our Division 1 clubs. We conducted several activities and secured brilliant media content that was banked and used throughout the season. This was a league first for community football and the SFNL was the envy of other community sporting competitions. In addition, we also rolled out four editions of fan engagement surveys which had an enormous response rate and provided the SFNL critical feedback to guide our future decision making.

With local government Council elections held in 2016, the SFNL utilised the opportunity to collectively represent our clubs and use our bargaining power to prospective councillors. A summary fast facts document was presented to every prospective councillor detailing information on the SFNL and, importantly, facility priorities for our clubs. The aim of the initiative was to ensure prospective councillors were aware of the SFNL and our clubs, to seek their support of the SFNL and club facility priorities and to identify sport-friendly and supportive prospective councillors.

Representative sport is something we are very passionate about and we were delighted to embrace the new structure of the AFL Victoria Community Championships, which incorporated almost every football league across Victoria. We were seeded 25 of approximately 40 leagues and fixtured against the Ellinbank & District Football League. Not only were we able to facilitate a Senior football representative match, but also an Under 18 football match, along with an Under 19, B-Grade and

A-Grade representative netball matches. In what was a fantastic opportunity for the SFNL, we hosted all matches in an integrated manner at the premium facility at Lyndhurst. Our Under 19 netball and Senior football teams secured great wins, while the others, although falling short, did a wonderful job in representing their clubs and the SFNL.

Club and competition growth continues to be extremely solid, particularly with new club acquisition as we welcomed Lyndhurst and Ports Melbourne Colts to the SFNL in 2016. Our netball competition also continues to go from strength to strength. From six divisions with 51 teams last year, to nine divisions with 74 teams, including the inaugural Under 19 competition, this growth is just astounding. We have come to the end of our initial operations strategy for netball and we have recently shared a proposal with all clubs for the next five years of netball. The figure on the previous page presents a very strong message for the SFNL.

The League has continued its association with existing partners and welcomed many new partners in 2016. Our partners are so important to the League and we sincerely thank them all for their support, particularly our major partners in Beiersdorf, Blackchrome Sportswear, Leader Newspapers, Sandown Greyhound Racing Club and SAS Security.

The administration team has been quite settled over the last 12 months. We have an amazingly dedicated team of full-timers, part-timers, casual contract honorary positions and many, many volunteers. I thank all the hardworking staff in the office who go over and above in their call of duty. To our Directors of Umpiring, for football Peter Marshall, along with his umpire support team, and for netball Kim Pentreath, as well as Julie Pool and Lynne Wilkosz for running the netball facility every week, well done on fantastic seasons respectively. To our expanding media team, particularly Executive Producer

(Radio) Robert Sharpe, who was strongly supported by Ian Dougherty, I thank you all for another wonderful contribution this past season.

To all club Presidents and their committees, including the SFL Umpires Association, I thank you for your continued collaboration with the SFNL and our team. I truly enjoy our positive working relationships and importantly friendships along the way.


To all the 2016 football and netball premiers and individual award recipients, on behalf of the entire SFNL we extend our congratulations to you all.

OPERATIONS REPORT

ADAM SPARROW GENERAL MANAGER - OPERATIONS

It is amazing to think how quickly another football season has come and gone. It has been a pleasure working with clubs and League stakeholders in what was another largely successful 2016 season.

It would be remiss of me to not open this report by acknowledging the club volunteer workforce that continues to display a great level of commitment and passion for their clubs, which is ultimately driving this League to continued success. I would like to thank each and every volunteer for your contribution, which includes often putting in countless and at times thankless hours to ensure the smooth and successful running of your respective clubs.

Competition Growth

Season 2016 saw the SFNL grow to a total of 163 teams – 74 netball and 89 football. This ultimately provided opportunities for more than 4000 participants to compete in organised community sport at SFNL Member Clubs.

We welcomed two new clubs to the SFNL in 2016, who joined the League from different paths. Firstly, the Lyndhurst Football Netball Club, who launched their inaugural senior football team in Division 3. To win six games in year one is a fantastic achievement and congratulations must go to President Andrew King and the entire team at Lyndhurst. We look forward to seeing what the future has in store for the club.

Secondly, we welcomed the Port Melbourne Colts, who joined Division 2 from the Western Region Football League and quickly set about putting their stamp on the competition. The club's senior team progressed through the season undefeated to claim the Division 2 premiership and they are a well drilled, highly skilled outfit who will no doubt shake-up Division 1 in 2017.

Umpiring

We welcomed Peter Marshall to the SFNL community during the 2016 pre-season. Peter took over the position of Director of Umpiring from his predecessor Peter Mair, who accepted a role with the VFL umpiring team. I would like to acknowledge Peter Mair for his fantastic contribution to the SFNL over a number of years.

With change comes exciting opportunities, and Peter Marshall certainly brings energy and excitement. Pete and his team hit the ground running in the pre-season, and as pre-season training numbers grew, so too did the atmosphere amongst the umpiring group. Pete has brought

many new philosophies and a new coaching style to the group and he and his team of coaches have set about implementing a longer-term plan to continue to raise the bar for the umpiring group. I would like to acknowledge the efforts of Pete, the entire coaching team and the broader umpiring group on a successful 2016 season.

The administration's relationship with the SFL Umpires Association remains strong and I must acknowledge the work of Alan Manning and Rodd Johnson, along with their committee. The work the association put in to ensure we offer participants a safe and welcoming environment is second to none, and this work was reflected in the atmosphere and strong attendance at training throughout the season.

Representative Football

2016 marked the introduction of the Worksafe AFL Victoria Community Championships. The revamped model saw metropolitan and country leagues from across Victoria battle it out for bragging rights, with a home fixture against Ellinbank & District Football League scheduled for the SFNL.

In May, we competed in five rep games at Lyndhurst across Senior Football, A-Grade and B-Grade Netball and, for the first time, both Under 18 Football and Under 19 Netball. The introduction of the youth programs provided a fantastic development opportunity for the next generation of SFNL stars.

The Senior Football Interleague team defeated Ellinbank by 49 points, their first representative victory since 2008. A fantastic reward for all involved.

Anecdotal and participant survey feedback responses showed that the 2016 program was regarded as the most professionally run program in recent history. The success of the program would not have been possible without the coaching team and support staff, including the diligent planning of Senior Head Coach Ben Lockwood and the assistance of Brad Collins, Peter Laspatzis, Clint Einsiedel and Chairman of Selectors Wayne Fuller.

Following our Senior Interleague victory, a total of eight SFNL senior players from six SFNL clubs were invited to the Vic Metro trials ahead of their representative match against Vic Country. Congratulations to Chris Horton-Milne (Dingley FNC), Jarryd Allen (St Pauls FNC) and Matt Troutbeck (Bentleigh FNC) who were all selected to represent Vic Metro on the back of their

Interleague performances. All players represented their clubs and the SFNL community with distinction. A special mention goes to Allen, who was elected Vice Captain of Vic Metro after being a member of the team for the past two seasons.

In their first hit out since 2008, our Under 18 representative team went down to a highly skilled EDFL outfit, however, it was not through a lack of effort or preparation. Head Coach Nathan Harris took the reins at short notice and set about implementing a highly professional program. Nathan, with the support of Assistant Coaches Peter Freeman, Lachlan Batt and Chairman of Selectors/Assistant Coach Wayne Herbstreit, delivered a program that offered the young participants an insight and exposure to training techniques and IP that many may not have experienced previously.

We look forward to seeing what the 2017 program has in store, but the early indication is that a road trip to battle a country league looks likely.

I would like to thank the coaches, players and support staff that volunteered their time and went above and beyond to ensure the success of the program. Thank you to the clubs for buying in and continuing to support the concept.

Finals

As we hit September, all eyes turned to finals. 2016 saw 24 of 34 Member Clubs compete in finals that spanned five weeks, and involved 48 games across seven venues.

I would like to thank the many volunteers that worked tirelessly from the following clubs to ensure the successful running of the 2016 SFNL SAS Security Finals Series.

There have been some significant contributions made by so many people and organisations to ensure the finals series ran smoothly. Several clubs took up hosting commitments at short notice due to unforeseen circumstances. Each club displayed a high level of organisation and acquitted themselves very well, all contributing to another great finals series. The work of all clubs is very much appreciated.



AFL Victoria Player Points / Salary Cap Policies

2016 saw the introduction of the AFL Victoria Player Points System. An education-based approach was adopted for year one, with the policy to become fully enforceable in 2017. The introduction of the points policy, along with the impending introduction of the AFL Victoria Salary Cap Policy, marks a significant change for community football. As a League, we are committed to working closely with clubs to ensure a smooth transition to the new systems.

In time, we hope to settle the total team points and salary cap at a level that will see the two policies work hand in hand to assist in achieving the greater longer term objective of ensuring community clubs can remain sustainable and financially viable within a competition that provides a competitive balance.

Women's Football

In early 2016 the wheels were set in motion to launch the inaugural 2017 SFNL Women's Football Competition. Working in collaboration with AFL Victoria and former Female Development Manager Chyloe Kurdas, a working party was formed with members identified based on skill set and

experience in set areas. This group was chartered with the objective to adopt a strategic view to lead culture change, a club development process and to ultimately establish the inaugural women's football competition in 2017.

The working party includes representation from the SFNL Board and administration, SFNL Female Football Project Officer, AFL Victoria, South Metro Junior Football League, local council, VWFL clubs and SFNL clubs.

13 SFNL Member Clubs have expressed interest in working to field a team as part of the inaugural season.

Three club development sessions have been facilitated throughout 2016, focusing on topics including club culture, recruitment strategies, government/facilities and sponsorship opportunities

To increase exposure and participation opportunities, several 'open skills training sessions' have also been facilitated for interested female players to come along and have a kick in a relaxed and fun environment. Participants have been kept up to date with competition plans and will look to transition into SFNL clubs for the 2017 season.

With the introduction of the AFL Women's competition in 2017, along with the recent announcement of AFL Victoria to disband the Victorian Women's Football League effective immediately, the women's football landscape remains dynamic and likely to evolve quickly over the coming seasons with significant participation growth expected.

Many thanks to my SFNL colleagues David, Matt, Will, Jenny and Jodie. Thank you for your support and congratulations on another successful year. Also, thank you to Jasmin and Shelley who joined the team in intern positions via Deakin University, along with James, a member of the Australian Rules Football College, a valued partner of the League. Your professionalism and dedication throughout the year provided great support to the team.

Finally, congratulations to all clubs who achieved the ultimate success in 2016, but more importantly, to those clubs who continue to strive to make things better both on and off the field. I look forward to seeing what 2017 has in store!


On and off the court, the 2016 netball year proved to be another success for the Southern Football Netball League. This success was marked by the League again experiencing a substantial growth in its number of netball teams. The 2016 season saw 74 teams take the court (up from 51 teams in 2015) competing across nine divisions.

26 of the SFNL's 34 Member Clubs were represented on the courts and we again expect this to grow in 2017. As our netball competition is continuing to expand, I would like to personally welcome the clubs who took to the court for the first time in 2016 – East Brighton, Lyndhurst and Oakleigh District.

In early 2016 the SFNL slightly restructured the administration team in the office to now incorporate a dedicated netball resource. The establishment of the Netball Officer role was critical for the future of netball in the SFNL, as you will see from many of the new initiatives that were introduced throughout the season.

One of these new initiatives in 2016 was the establishment of the Under 19 netball competition. In year one, five teams entered this competition. This was spread across three clubs; Dingley and Mordialloc entered two teams whilst Skye entered one. The Under 19 competition is something we will look to build on and develop further in 2017.

On the back of the inaugural year of Netball Interleague in 2015, the Southern Football Netball League once again did battle with the Northern Netball League at Parade College in May. Unfortunately, the results did not go our way but it was great experience for the girls, especially the inaugural



Under 19 team. Special mention must go to our Best on Court players for the night; Alicia Wise (A-Grade) and Maggie Carlon (Under 19).

In line with the AFL Victoria Community Championships, three SFNL Netball Interleague teams (A-Grade, B-Grade and Under 19) ventured to Marriott Waters Reserve, Lyndhurst, to compete against a strong Ellinbank & District Netball Association. Unfortunately for the A-Grade and B-Grade teams, the result did not go our way, but our Under 19 team secured a comfortable 15-goal victory to claim our first representative netball trophy. Again, special mentions must go to our Best on Court players for the day; Sophie O'Shea (A-Grade), Sara Merkus (B-Grade) and Mia McMillan (Under 19).

We must also acknowledge the work of the program's head coach Melanie Starr (A-Grade), who was assisted by Penny Byers-Tymms (B-Grade), Nicki Arnold (Under 19) and Alicia Wise (Under 19). The quartet all brought a high level of experience and professionalism to the program, something which we will be building on for 2017.

One of the challenges we faced this season was the Saturday afternoon 2:40pm timeslot. As a League, we will continue to explore new options in 2017 with the help of clubs. This process has already commenced with the circulation of the 'Voice of The South' operational survey and the netball operations strategy (2017 – 2021) proposal.

Another new initiative was the introduction of the Sunday Netball Grand Finals, which were broadcast live on community radio station 88.3 Southern FM for the first time by a dedicated radio team consisting of lan Dougherty, Sophie O'Shea (Caulfield), Melodie Aitken (Chelsea Heights) and Hugh Maclean. Over 800 people attended the Rowan Road courts over the course of the afternoon to experience some of the best matches of the SFNL season. In terms of results, the premiers were Cheltenham (Division 8),



Mount Waverley (Division 7), Lyndhurst (Division 6), Black Rock (Division 5), South Yarra (Division 4), Dingley Two (Under 19), Heatherton (Division 3), Heatherton (Division 2) and Heatherton (Division 1).

As a League, we continue to integrate the netball competition into the football competition with several new initiatives. These include the introduction of a pre-season rules session for netball coordinators and umpires, a streamlined VNA and team registration process, the Westfield Netballer of the Week and Netballer of the Year awards, Leading Goal Shooter awards and Netball Team of the Year recognition.

As a result of the administration team's hard work, the League was shortlisted for the Outstanding Large Association/ League of the Year award which was presented at the Netball Victoria Community Awards in October. Unfortunately, the SFNL did not win the award but it was nevertheless great recognition for all involved in the League

The SFNL administration would like to acknowledge the Springvale & District Netball Association (SDNA) for their continued support of the netball program. Special mention must go to SDNA President Julie Pool, Umpire Manager Kim Pentreath, Court Supervisor Lyn Wilkosz and the entire

SDNA team for the support provided behind the scenes at the Rowan Road Netball Complex on game days. The competition continues to flourish with their ongoing support.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge all those people who worked either in a club committee position or in any volunteering role at clubland in 2016 and would like to thank you all for your ongoing support.

Enjoy the off-season and we'll see you all in 2017!

UMPIRING DEPARTMENT REPORT

PETER MARSHALL DIRECTOR OF UMPIRING

It's indeed my pleasure to deliver my first report as Director of Umpiring.

Season 2016 started for the group on February 4th. I had officially been appointed two days earlier, and suffice to say we hit the ground running.

Over my 44-year career in footy and umpiring I've been involved in a lot of different organisations, leagues and umpiring bodies. I don't exaggerate when I say 2016 was one of the most pleasurable and exciting seasons I've been involved in.

The support I was given by the CEO David Cannizzo and his team was outstanding, and together with the Umpires Association led by Alan Manning, and my coaching group, I'm truly satisfied and proud of what we delivered to the SFNL and its Member Clubs.

I inherited a group ripe for the picking and I pay credit to my predecessor, Peter Mair, who moved to the VFL in full time employment and that within itself is a credit to the League.

My report is broken down to:

- Match Day Performance
- Development
- Accreditation
- Coaching
- Relationships2017 Looking Forward

Match Day Performance

With over 4000 appointments for the season, getting numbers on the park was our first challenge, especially with matches spread all across the south of Melbourne every week. From Port Melbourne in the north west, to Hallam in the east and as far south as Carrum, the SFNL's footprint is an extensive one.

Although our boundary numbers were challenged, we were reasonably satisfied with our strike rate to supply suitably efficient umpires.

Minimal issues arose on Saturdays and all games had two umpires in the field. In actual fact, for the first time in the SFNL, the three field umpire system in Senior games became the norm. In total, 160 games had three field umpires officiate, which allowed the game to flow, and saw less incidents and fewer free kicks paid.

We had 317 umpires registered in 2016, with 117 field umpires having a run – an all-time SFNL record. 80% of our list are under 30 years of age and we have over 40 female umpires, a number that's continuing to grow.

In the field, 65 umpired senior footy, 40 of those in Division 1 and 26 for the first time in the SFNL.

Finals saw 387 umpiring appointments with hardly a hiccup. Only five reports were laid and our mantra, "to let 'em play footy and only intervene when necessary", was adhered to. In fact, the Division 1 Senior Grand Final had just 15 free kicks paid for the entire game

Of course, not always did we live up to our high standards and umpires were rotated through the grades.

During home and away matches, we worked on controlling the game, letting it flow, taking appropriate action when required and working as a team.

Development

With such a young group, I was mindful to have the correct balance of experience and youth. Birth certificates were thrown out the window.

From our oldest umpires to our young guns, we all umpired together and our mentoring program, both at training and on match day, worked admirably.

Over 60 umpires tasted senior footy for the first time and with the introduction of more three umpire games in the field, we are well placed for 2017.

Working closely with the AFL/VFL Umpiring Departments, the SFNL participated in many programs and adjudicated quite a few challenge games, school games, representative matches and national carnivals. We also had six umpires attend VFL training as rookies, as well officiate in the Worksafe AFL Victoria Community Championships, Women's matches and TAC Cup games.

Our young guns also were involved in mentor programs with AFL Umpires.

We have again nominated five umpires to trial for the VFL in 2017 and we look forward to them progressing their careers like those before them who have gone up through the pathway from the SFNL.

Accreditation

This has become an integral part of officiating in any sport around Australia and the SFNL supported the AFL's goal to have all community umpires and coaches accredited.

Courses were conducted and online self-driven education was undertaken to ensure SFNL umpire accreditation and, as a result, we saw 90% of our field and goal umpires accredited. There is still work to be done to boost the number of accredited boundary umpires.

Coaching

Season 2016 saw the coaching panel grow to 15 and I was delighted with the experience, knowledge and delivery by our team.

With myself included, we introduced four new people to the team and the umpiring group received more match day feedback than ever before. The group benefited from this accordingly.

Peter Bailey filmed matches and on Tuesday nights conducted video revision, opening the floor for individuals to analyse their game. Oral, written and visual feedback, was delivered and throughout the finals all umpires were given an observer's view on their game. Our mantra was to assist and improve all umpires.

The coaches gave up so much of their time and provided great energy to the group. I was very grateful to have such a loyal and dedicated team behind me.

Relationships

Our game is based around relationships and working together for the betterment of the game.

Umpires are an important part of the game, but are not the game. We are the League's biggest club and in many cases one of the biggest expenses in conducting the game.

The SFNL is one of few leagues in Victoria that supply umpires in all three disciplines to all games (Thirds excluded) and I am thankful for the wonderful support we received from the clubs on most occasions. Generally, umpires were made to feel welcome, wanted, respected and safe. Recruitment starts with retention, and the match day experience goes a long way in keeping people in the game.

As mentioned, I could not have wished for more support from the SFNL Board, led by David

Coutts, and the administration team of David Cannizzo, Adam Sparrow and Matt Grimwood. From support for three field umpire system, accreditation for coaches, trainers, equipment, invitations to functions and many other requests, their door was always open.

Media Officer Will Hunter was outstanding in his media work and encouraged umpire stories on a weekly basis. Together with The White Knight's Record columns, they gave us great exposure.

I opened the door for club coaches to engage with us, and although I couldn't hand back four points, I felt there was honesty and transparency between both parties.

Our umpires were involved in the Worksafe AFL Victoria Community Championships and the barriers have truly been broken down. We are in the game together.

Special acknowledgement must go to AFL Victoria Umpiring Development Officer Neville Nash for his guidance and the opportunities afforded to our umpires.

Season 2016 saw a stronger bond forged with the SMJFL. We provided the bulk of the coaches and provided opportunities for young umpires to dip their toe in the water in a senior league. The other important relationship is to have a good working bond with the Umpires Association. Alan Manning and Rodd Johnson, along with their Board, provided great support to my coaching group and the new ideas I brought on in 2016.

Many thanks to all those people I have mentioned and plenty of others I may have forgotten, but I'm sure you know who you are.

2017 - Looking Forward

Our goals and objectives for 2017 and beyond are:

- To cover our games in all disciplines, including the planned SFNL Women's Competition;
- To ensure all our umpires are Level 1 Accredited;
- To participate in all AFL/VFL Umpire Programs;
- To retain and recruit more umpires, focusing on the SMJFL and female umpires;
- To provide opportunities to the younger umpires to progress through the pathway to VFL;

- To continue the three field umpire system in the seniors and, when possible, in the Under 19s;
- To educate umpires through feedback (written and visual) and improve as a group;
- To work with the SFNL and clubs in improving the standard and discipline of football;
- To establish a strong off-field body in readiness for transition back to Moorabbin Reserve in 2018

In closing, Australian Rules is the cornerstone of our community in Victoria and having a strong umpiring body goes a long way to ensuring we have a good, viable, creditable football league.

I look forward to heading up the department once again in 2017 and doing our bit for the SENI

MARKETING AND PARTNERSHIP REPORT

JODIE-LEE MURPHY MARKETING AND PARTNERSHIP MANAGER

The marketing and partnership space was another area in which the SFNL experienced significant growth and development in 2016. Several new partners came on board during the course of the year, which is critical to the ongoing strength of our competition, while a number of exciting new initiatives, activations and events were implemented to further engage with key League stakeholders.

Voice of the South

This year the SFNL launched the Voice of the South, a new initiative to continue to evolve the League through a series of fan engagement surveys to various stakeholders. The surveys featured a wide range of questions on all areas of the League, and were broken down into four short surveys, with each one focusing on a different topic.

The survey topics covered Football and Netball Operations, Engagement (with a strong focus on media), Club Management and Match Day.

We had an overwhelming response to our surveys from football and netball players, officials, umpires and other SFNL stakeholders with almost 2,000 completed surveys. The results have so far been of great benefit, and will continue to help the SFNL's ongoing vision to remain a strong, successful and sustainable League and provide players, supporters and

officials with the best possible football and netball programs.

The League has already implemented some quick wins based on the survey feedback in areas such as the website, Record, fixturing, promotion/relegation and the grading process. The results have also aided the League and Member Clubs in providing data to Councils to assist with grants and the future of our grounds.

The SFNL are continuing to analyse this data with the view to making further improvements in 2017.

Community Partnerships & Events beyondblue Round

The League believes the partnership of community groups and charities is imperative to the health and welfare of our players, officials, umpires and indeed all stakeholders. It's for this reason the SFNL decided to strengthen its relationship with community partner beyondblue through a League-wide themed round.

beyondblue Round was held on the weekend of July 2-3, with the marquee beyondblue Cup match played between Mordialloc and Dingley. The combined results from each of the two clubs' Division 1 Senior and Reserve

football, and Division 2, Division 5 and Under 19 netball clashes determined the overall winner of the beyondblue Cup, with Dingley ultimately claiming the silverware. A fundraising luncheon was also held at Mordialloc's Ben Kavanagh Reserve and featured beyondblue Ambassador and former AFL star James Podsiadly among a host of guest speakers that touched on the very important and sensitive issue of mental health.

The weekend also saw several clubs host beyondblue luncheons, gala balls, raffles and sausage sizzles to raise awareness and funds for this wonderful organisation. In addition to these club events, the League also created SFNL and beyondblue co-branded blue socks with the assistance of Blackchrome Sportswear. Clubs purchased these socks for their football and netball teams to wear over the weekend, with all proceeds raised from their sale going to beyondblue.

Through all of these events and initiatives, the SFNL and its clubs raised over \$5,000 for beyondblue.

Pride Shield

In another community initiative, the SFNL facilitated the establishment of the League's first Pride Shield match between St Kilda City and St Pauls. The SFNL met with a number of key stakeholders before embarking on this ground-breaking initiative.

Deliberately coinciding with St Kilda's AFL Pride Match against the Sydney Swans at Etihad Stadium on August 15, the SFNL's pride themed game aimed to tackle homophobia in football and netball and celebrate diversity and inclusion in sport for the lesbian, gay, transgender, bisexual and intersex (LGBTI) communities.

Rainbow colours featured prominently around the Peanut Farm as a show of solidarity with the LGBTI community, with the goal umpires waving rainbow flags, the players wearing rainbow laces in their boots and rainbow 50m arcs painted onto the playing surface. In addition, a Pride Shield was instituted for the winner of the match, with St Pauls becoming the inaugural recipient of the prize.

St Kilda City also hosted a cocktail luncheon on the day with key figures from the LGBTI community in attendance to provide some compelling words. Jason Ball, the first Aussie Rules player at any level to come out as gay, was the function's keynote speaker, while the Victorian State Government Commissioner for Gender and Sexuality, Rowena Allan, and the Minister for Equality, Martin Foley, also spoke of the importance of the day.

Partnerships

The League continued to maintain and grow their partnerships with businesses and services we felt would provide great synergy with the League and its stakeholders.

Pleasingly, we had the overwhelming majority of our 2015 partners continue their alliance with us again this year, while we also welcomed new partners Australian Rules Football College, Gameday Mouthguards, Marbut Stone, Westfield Fountain Gate and LifeCare to the fold ahead of the 2016 season. Our cohort of partnerships continued to grow late in the year with the recent additions of Sporting Fine Art, MultiSkill Training and Atura Dandenong, and they will have a larger presence in 2017.

The SFNL also greatly appreciates the continued support of our major partners Blackchrome Sportswear, Sandown

Greyhounds, Beiersdorf/Elastoplast, Leader Newspapers and SAS Security.

Partner Activations

The SFNL aims to continually maximise integration opportunities for partners to better deliver returns on their investment. To achieve these results, new and innovative campaigns that deliver on fan engagement, club benefit and digital integration are increasingly important.

In 2016, our partner activations strategy allowed for better engagement between our partners and SFNL stakeholders through themed rounds, branding of our digital content and naming rights to our football competitions, among other initiatives. In addition, the SAS Security Finals Series featured several popular in-venue activations that delivered on fan engagement, including:

- Sporting Fine Art Grand Final and Premiership posters created for Division 1 and 2 Grand Finals, with a product stall set up on Division 1 Grand Final day to facilitate sales;
- A Woodlands Golf Club putting competition on Division 2 Grand Final day;
- A Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles meetand-greet courtesy of Westfield Fountain Gate on Division 3 Grand Final day.

Our football Interleague program was also well supported by our partners, with each representative player receiving a special player kit bag filled with useful products from partners including Blackchrome Sportswear, Gameday Mouthguards, Elastoplast, Westfield Fountain Gate, Bentleigh RSL and LifeCare. Optimus Health Group administered free base line concussion testing for each Interleague player, while Westfield Fountain Gate also provided around-the-ground activations on the day, including face painting and balloon

As part of this arrangement, the League also agreed to take on ARFC student James Dawe as an office intern for 10 months. MEDIA REPORT

WILL HUNTER MEDIA OFFICER

The League's media operations took giant strides forward in 2016, with a key focus on the visual medium. Through new social media activations and an overhaul of SFNL TV, among other initiatives, the SFNL was able to vastly boost its engagement with fans and its social media reach, resulting in much improved brand awareness.

Media Day

Without doubt the most ground-breaking new media initiative implemented by the League was the introduction of the inaugural Media Day back in early March, the first of its kind ever staged by a community football organisation.

The Media Day concept drew inspiration from the American College sporting model, in which the governing body invites athletes and coaches from each of the colleges to a central location to film several different media activities. During League CEO David Cannizzo's trip to the United States in late 2015, he experienced first-hand how the Mountain West Conference executed their Media Day, and his key learnings underpinned the SFNL's own Media Day.

As part of the Media Day, the SFNL invited two senior players and the senior coach from each of the 10 Division 1 clubs to Moorabbin Reserve for a couple of hours on a Sunday afternoon to record several different media initiatives. Separate areas were set up to conduct each media activity, with clubs rotating between them as per a prearranged schedule. These activities included a professional photo shoot, press conference style interviews, radio voice-over recording and the filming of both promotional messages and entertaining social media videos.

The Media Day was an overwhelming success, with the League banking a massive catalogue of content that was rolled out throughout the season on a multitude of platforms for a plethora of purposes. The resulting media outputs provided great engagement on social media, helped promote themed rounds, marquee matches and League initiatives, formed part of our advertising and marketing

collateral and provided content for news and feature stories in the lead up to the season.

Pleasingly, we received fantastic buy-in from all clubs for this inaugural event, and I would like to extend my gratitude to all the players, coaches and presidents for their assistance in getting this exciting new concept off the ground. We could not have done so without your support.

The League aims to grow the Media Day in 2017 through the inclusion of all senior football teams across all three divisions, as well as netball and potentially women's football, with a view to increase commercial opportunities for the SFNL through additional partner activations and sponsorship of the end products.

Social Media

An increased emphasis was placed on our social media operations in 2016, with the aim to broaden the League's social media footprint and further connect with our target demographic. Through the implementation of a number of new initiatives, we were able to greatly boost our following and engagement through our social media channels.

Our social media strategy has for the last few years been based around interaction with clubs and fans through the delivery of popular and shareable content. To that end, the SFNL Media Day has been a terrific success, as it saw the creation of popular new content pieces that provided great entertainment value and engaged our audience. Of these, 'The Awkward Bounce' series, which saw the Division 1 players and coaches providing a montage of entertaining answers to different questions, was easily the biggest hit with fans on Facebook, totalling around 27,500 views across the 15 episodes.

The cumulative effect of these and other initiatives resulted in exponential growth in our social media following, and particularly Facebook, which has proven to be our most popular social media channel for interaction with fans. Nearly 1000 new Facebook page likes were recorded between March and November, which represents a 25% boost in

just eight months. This places the SFNL among the most rapidly expanding local sporting competitions in the social media space.

SFNL TV

The fourth season of the SFNL's online TV show saw it undergo its most radical overhaul. In a drastic departure from the regular studio set up, SFNL TV was filmed instead alongside the SFNL Radio Team on match days throughout the entire season and attempted to capture all the colour and atmosphere of the SFNL Match of the Day. In doing so, the 2016 iteration of SFNL TV proved to be a more dynamic offering than in previous seasons, which ran only during the finals series and focussed solely on interviews with coaches and players, as well as reviews/previews of finals matches.

Produced by SFNL videographer Ornell Amaratunga, SFNL TV gave viewers an access-all-areas glimpse into the inner sanctum of the SFNL clubs. It featured prematch and post-match interviews with club presidents, coaches, players and fans, behind-the-scenes colour footage, special guests, match highlights and coverage of club and League events and initiatives.

In all, 22 episodes were produced during the season. Released on Facebook, YouTube and the SFNL website, the series averaged nearly 1500 viewers per episode, more than double the average of the six-part 2015 series.

Website

The SFNL's official website, sfnl.com.au, remains the key communication platform between the league and its members. The website was updated with new and engaging content almost daily in season, and links to web pages and news stories were regularly posted on Facebook and Twitter to help drive traffic back to the site. As a result, more than 376,000 pageviews and 75,772 unique users were recorded between April and October.

Record

The SFNL Record consolidated its position as one of the best local football publications in Victoria and continues to be a popular part of the SFNL match day experience.



A further emphasis was placed on netball reporting, which proved to be the biggest and most popular change to the Record in 2016. The League engaged Hugh Maclean as its dedicated netball reporter, and his column, 'The Cut and Drive', provided an entertaining and in-depth analysis of the SFNL Netball competition each week of the season.

The Record was once again used to promoted league events, initiatives and themed rounds, such as Indigenous Round, beyondblue Round and the Pride Shield match, through special themed Record covers and feature stories. Standalone Record covers were also used for each of the three senior football Grand Finals, as well as the SFNL Netball Grand Finals.

Radio

In keeping with our increased focus on netball coverage, the League called the Netball

Division 1 and 2 Grand Finals live on 88.3

Southern FM. The specially-appointed team of callers Sophie O'Shea and Melodie Aitken and courtside reporter Hugh Maclean provided commentary and insights of the two netball matches with the assistance of lan Dougherty. We believe this is the first time that netball has been called live on community radio anywhere in Australia, and following the success of this broadcast, we aim to continue this netball coverage in the years to come.

Another first for the League was the introduction of a one-off, standalone half-hour netball program on one Sunday morning in July. Hosted by Aitken and Alicia Wise, the show provided comprehensive coverage of all divisions of the SFNL Netball competition before leading into our regular radio show at 10:30am.

In addition, last year's award-winning Sunday Football Netball Show underwent a marketing-driven rebrand during the offseason, adopting the name 'The 5th Quarter' for the 2016 season. The new moniker was chosen to increase its marketability, while also ensuring it was reflective of both football and netball and resonated with our listenership.

I wish to conclude this report by offering my sincere thanks to our tremendous team of hard-working journalists, broadcasters, photographers and videographers for their outstanding efforts in 2016. Your contributions throughout the season have helped the League reset the bar in terms of its football and netball coverage and I look forward to working closely with you all again in 2017.

INTERLEAGUE REPORT

Season 2016 saw the most successful Interleague campaign the Southern Football Netball League has had for many years, with both our footballers and netballers claiming silverware at the newly-established Worksafe AFL Victoria Community Championships in May.

Footbal

As part of the revamped representative carnival, the SFNL hosted Ellinbank & District Football League in Senior and Under 18 football matches at Marriott Waters Reserve, Lyndhurst.

And it was a new-look senior team in more ways than one. A brand new guernsey honouring the SFNL's rich history was designed that featured a modern twist on the famous Federal Football League rep jumper of yesteryear.

Coached by East Malvern's Ben Lockwood and captained by Dingley skipper Tony Lavars, the line-up featured a host of first-time SFNL representatives. Included among them was 17-year-old Mount Waverley winger Jackson Smith, who, in just his seventh game of senior football, became the first ever Division 3 player selected in a Southern Interleague team.

While the SFNL set about atoning for consecutive heavy defeats to metropolitan rivals, our regional visitors were gunning for their fourth straight representative victory.

It was Southern that signalled their intent from the moment the ball was bounced, slotting the game's first goal in the opening minute before added another two in quick succession to get the early jump on the Ellinbank.

The visitors attacked hard with the wind in the second term, but could make no inroads into the three-goal quarter time deficit thanks to a water-tight Southern defensive unit. Southern then clicked into gear after the long break, slamming on five goals to one in a dominant third term to take the wind out of Ellinbank's sails.

The SFNL simply ran their opponents off their legs, and their midfield dominance, both inside and out, allowed the fleet-footed forward line to come into the game. Southern's manic pressure on the Ellinbank ball carriers was also immense, leading to plenty of midfield turnovers and repeat forward 50 entries. As a result, Matt Troutbeck (five goals) and Callum Cathcart (four majors) hit the scoreboard with increasing regularity.

Despite holding an imposing seven-goal advantage at the final change, the SFNL boys didn't let up in the last quarter as they cruised to a 49-point victory – the League's first since 2008.

Oakleigh District's Pat Carroll won the medal as best on ground with a sublime display in defence, while Brody Hodic and Andrew Frost were also pillars of strength down back. The Southern midfield was also dominant, with Ricky Thomson, Ed Sim, Nathan Robinson and Jarryd Allan providing plenty of hardness around the contest.

Earlier, the Southern Under 18s were comprehensively outclassed by a bigger, stronger and more mature Ellinbank & District FL outfit to the tune of 66 points.

The stronger bodies of the Ellinbank boys gave them a sizable advantage around the contests, and kicking with the aid of the breeze in the first term, blitzed to a commanding 51-point lead at quarter time.

The Southern youngsters showed great mental fortitude from that point on to work back into the contest, displaying genuine flair and a vastly improved work rate. However, for all their competitiveness after the first change, the damage inflicted in the opening term couldn't be undone, and ultimately proved to be the decisive factor in the game.

Diminutive St Kilda City star Jesse Firebrace dazzled off half back and was a deserved winner of the best on ground medal, while his Saints teammate Ayang Nyanjok proved a dominant force both in the ruck and up forward with two goals.

Netball

The SFNL's top netballers also got the chance to shine at Lyndhurst as they took on the Ellinbank & District Netball Association for the first time in separate A-Grade, B-Grade and Under 19 Interleague matches.

Our Under 19 girls got the day off to the perfect start with a 51-36 win over EDNA, and in doing so delivered the League its first ever netball Interleague trophy.

The sublime skill and tenacity on display from the League's young guns was impressive, and gave a glimpse into the exciting future of the SFNL Netball competition. With captain and Best on Court medallist Mia McMillan in sublime form up front, the Southerners led at

every change en route to the historic victory.

The B-Grade side, however, found the going much tougher, outclassed by a superior EDNA outfit 31 to 46.

Despite a promising opening stanza from the SFNL, the visitors gained the ascendancy in the second term and never looked back.
Captain Sara Merkus took home the medal as Southern's best player.

Finally, the highly anticipated A-Grade match lived up to the hype, but unfortunately, the result didn't go our way as Southern were narrowly beaten by EDNA 46 to 41.

Little separated the two teams for much of the game, but a purple patch either side of the final change saw EDNA race out to a 13-goal lead early in the last quarter. With their backs to the wall, the Southern girls fought hard to work back into the contest, but disappointingly the final buzzer ended their hopes of a miraculous come-from-behind victory.

Nevertheless, it was a very promising performance from the SFNL. Sophie O'Shea's dominance under the ring saw her rewarded with the Best on Court medallion, while skipper Alicia Wise and Tayla Fiddes were also influential.

In addition to these matches against EDNA, the A-Grade and Under 19 teams again took on the strong Northern Netball League in representative clashes at Parade College, Bundoora, in the week preceding the AFL Victoria Community Championships.

Unfortunately, Northern again proved too good for our girls in both matches. The A-Grade team gave it their all, but the might of the towering NNL shooters helped them home 81 to 54. Captain Wise was awarded the SFNL's Best on Court medal for her standout performance.

The earlier Under 19s match, however, was a tighter affair. The SFNL girls started positively, before eventually falling to Northern 34 to 52, with Maggie Carlon adjudged Southern's best.

TREASURER'S REPORT

DEAN MORRISON TREASURER

The 2016 financial results reflect a year of continued growth.

Whilst 2015 was a solid year, 2016 proved to be another year in which the League continued to improve. The League is now in a position to continue to push forward.

The League achieved a surplus of \$11,516 – up from a surplus of \$4,548 in 2015.

Our turnover increased from \$1.54m in 2015 to \$1.68m in 2016 – marking an increase of 9%.

Reducing the reliance on finals income continues to be a challenge. In 2016, revenue from this stream was down by approximately \$1,000 compared to 2015. Pleasingly, though, our sponsorship income was approximately \$35,000 above 2015 figures. This is a great result in an environment where obtaining and servicing sponsorship is a tough job.

The League's expenses increased during the financial year from \$1,538,046 in 2015 to \$1,670,870. Some reasons for this were:

 The ongoing commitment to social events such as Season Launch, Hall of Fame and Women of the South Cocktail Event. These events continue to promote the League in a great way, however, at times these do incur a cost. The admin team will continue to monitor and fine tune these.

- The continual increase in the number of netball teams, which means increased costs. Importantly, after feedback from the clubs, we are providing netball with the resources to ensure its continued growth through a combination of an office restructure and new appointments.
- The provision for long service leave that was created this year. As the CEO enters the fifth year of employment (and is contracted for a sixth year), the auditor suggested this would be prudent. This adjustment created an expense of just under \$11,000.
- A club development program through Terry Dillon Solutions for Division 3 clubs, which was also a new initiative undertaken throughout the year. Whilst the League was able to source a sponsor to cover some of the cost involved, this

was nevertheless an extra expense this year. It is, however, a positive in assisting with the sustainability of our clubs. The balance sheet continues to indicate the league is in a healthy position.

Our receivables have also decreased compared to 2015. It was a priority of the finance team to ensure this decreased, and as a result the total balance is down by approximately \$28,000, which means this money is in the bank account. The Board continued to support those clubs that needed financial assistance and extensions for payment. This was dependant on them communicating the circumstances and complying with payment terms.

I feel the SFNL can be proud of the financial position it is in and the platform for the coming years is sound.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2016

1. Significant Accounting Policies

a. Incorporation

Southern Football Netball League Inc. was incorporated on 5 January 2009.

b. Basis of preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Associations Incorporations Reform Act 2012.

The financial report of Southern Football Netball League Inc. as an individual entity complies with Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards. Compliance with Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

The financial report has been prepared under the historical cost convention modified by revaluations of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the association in the preparation and presentation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

c. Accounting policies

i. Revenue

Affiliation fees and sponsorships are recognised as revenue on a time proportional basis.

Revenue from the sale of goods, principally comprising footballs, uniforms, equipment and records to member clubs is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have passed to the buyer and the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably. Risks and rewards of ownership are considered as having passed to the buyer upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenues from the provision of services are recognised upon delivery of the service.

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when it is controlled. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of those grants for specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets

ii. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

iii. Inventorie

Inventories primarily comprise stocks of football equipment and uniforms held for resale and are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

iv. Financial instruments

Receivables

Trade and other receivables when initially recognised are measured at fair value, which normally approximates their nominal value. Subsequently they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Payables

Trade and other accounts payable are recognised when the association becomes obliged to make future payments resulting from the purchase of goods or services. When initially recognised they are measured at fair value, which normally approximates their nominal value. Subsequently they are measured at amortised cost.

Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

The depreciable amount of items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The assets' residual values and useful lives of assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted if appropriate. During the current year Leasehold Improvements at the Linton street premises were written off when those premises were vacated in preparation for the redevelopment of the Moorabbin Reserve.

The following estimated useful lives are used in the calculation of depreciation and amortisatioon:

vi. Employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period.

Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs.

Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

Contributions are made by the entity to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

vii. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

viii. Income tax

No Provision for Income Tax has been raised, as the entity is exempt from Income Tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

ix. Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

10. Commitments

a. Commitments arising from the development of Moorabbin Reserve

The Southern Football Netball League (SFNL) is one of the parties to arrangements for the development of state-of-the-art sports training, administration and match facilities at the Moorabbin Reserve at Linton Street, Moorabbin.

Under these arrangements SFNL has agreed to contribute \$250,000 (plus GST) to the cost of the development and will in turn receive rights for the use of an area of the proposed new pavilion for an administrative office as well as rights of access to various other facilities at the premises.

In preparation for the commencement of works it has been necessary for SFNL as well as the South Metro Junior Football League (SMJFL) to vacate their previous administrative offices at the Moorabbin Reserve.

On 1 February 2016 SFNL and SMJFL jointly entered into a 2 year lease (with a further 6 months option) of premises in Keys Road, Moorabbin to provide temporary administrative offices during the development period at an annual rental of \$60,000. An allocation of \$100,000 from the budget for the development of the Moorabbin Reserve has been made towards the cost of relocating SFNL and SMJFL for up to 24 months and the funding of the monthly rental of the Keys Road Premises (net of SFNL and SMJFLs contribution) is being met from this.

Additional funds from the development budget were also allocated and applied to cover moving and like costs.
